Any quilt that is equal to or less than 30" on all sides and does not fit the definition of "miniature quilt."

Maverick Quilts and Lone Star Quilt Study Group

This month's education update has a lot of ground to cover, literally from Fort Worth to LaGrange to Charleston, SC and then back to Dallas for a little history of a founding mother.

Maverick Quilts: Off the Wall

Please make plans to go to Fort Worth in the New Year — yes, after the decorations have been put away and you've returned from the Guild retreat. *The National Cowgirl Museum and Hall of Fame* is mounting an exhibition titled, "Maverick Quilts: Off the Wall" which runs from January 17 through March 31, 2013. The exhibition has been curated from The Quilt Complex collection. If that name doesn't ring a bell perhaps Julie Silber does. She has spoken to the Dallas Guild a few times—twice that I can think of, but then those are the times I helped host her and there may have been more times. Julie is a solid quilt scholar and dealer with a sense of humor. The PR describes this exhibit as follows, "Paired alongside a traditional quilt pattern, these "maverick" quilts display an unusual twist on the ordinary, a verve and a gritty individuality rarely found in more studied and self-conscious quilts. On display will be 30 made between 1850 and 1950." That is scholarly lingo for "What was she thinking?!!!" These are quilts that you haven't seen in antique quilt books and they may be a great inspiration as you consider how to set the blocks for a quilt or what to do with an unusual color in your stash.

I'm going to preach a little here, so if you are already planning to go you can skip this paragraph. We have to support cultural institutions when they mount exhibitions of our art form. When we show up, buy a ticket and maybe even purchase something in their museum shop, we are reminding them of the importance and power of quilters. Museums are regularly inundated with exhibition rental proposals. When we show up to see the quilts, that makes bringing in quilt exhibitions more desirable for the institution. So, **please go**, take your friends, and tell those you don't take how wonderful it was when you get back. Sermon over.

The Board of our Guild has shown our support for this exhibition by contributing \$1,000 toward the more than \$20,000 cost to bring the exhibition to the museum.

Don't know how to get to the exhibit? It is simple—get on I-30 and go west young lady. Get off on the Montgomery Street exit [now how hard is that name to remember?] and turn right. There will be a sign a few blocks down on the right pointing you to The National Cowgirl Museum and Hall of Fame on Gendy Street. The last time I was there parking was free, but don't hold me to it, especially if you go during the Fort Worth Stock Show & Rodeo (01/18-02/09). For those of you used to shopping at Cabbage Rose Quilt Shop you just turn right coming off I-30 instead of left. Naturally, while you're supporting quilt displays in museums, you should also support the independent quilt stores along the way. If you haven't been to Cabbage Rose, Karen carries a wide variety of lines and has a helpful, generally younger than me, staff. I love how bright her "new" shop is. There are several other quilt shops between here and there, in Arlington and other mid-cities locations.

Another way to go is to sign up for Sally Ashbacher's tour to the exhibit. Just get on the bus and leave the driving to them. Look for additional information on the tour on page 12 in this issue of the newsletter.

Julie Silber of the Quilt Complex is curating a collection of 30 quilts made between 1850 and 1950 that are easily recognizable designs, but done in more unusual, personal interpretations of traditional patterns. (think: Modern Quilts before Modern Quilts were “cool.”) The exhibit is being hosted by the National Cowgirl Museum and Hall of Fame in Fort Worth, Texas.

The Board decided that it might be fun to offer Guild members an opportunity to travel in a group to see this unique show. Therefore, a quality trip has been planned for Saturday March 16, 2013.

The bus will depart from the parking lot of the flagship Half-Price Books store just east of 75 on Northwest Highway at 9:00 a.m. Our group will be met at the Fort Worth venue by museum docents who will guide us thru the exhibit. Both museums have wonderful gift shops for our shopping pleasure. After lunch, we will board the bus and make a stop at the Cabbage Rose Quilt Shop for a fabric fix before we returning to Dallas.

Annually, the Guild awards the Founder's and Silver Thimble Awards. Guild founder, Helena Hibbs, initiated these awards in 1984, and for many years personally made the awards. Nominations are solicited from the membership, and a committee of past recipients select the current year's recipients from nominations submitted by the membership. The awards recognize members who have volunteered their time and skills for the success of the Guild.

Silver Thimble Awards

The Silver Thimble Award honorees are members who have been members of the Guild for at least three years and who have gone above and beyond in their volunteer duties.

FBI, she started a longarm quilting business called Harvest Moon Quilting. She joined the Guild in September of 1997, is a member of the Loose Threads friendship group, and also sews with a group at Quilter's Connection. She is also a member of the Embroiderer's Guild of America.

She began volunteering at Quilt Celebration around 1999, and has volunteered every day the show is open to the public since then, except for the year we were at Fair Park. That year, she had volunteered on Friday, and was about to leave for the show venue on Saturday morning, when FBI duties called - a kidnapping in Troupe, TX. Early on, her usual activities included quilt angel, the raffle quilt booth, lectures, and (of course) the mini quilt auction.

In 2007, she and Bonnie McElearnery were recruited by Richard Larson to join the Show committee to chair the Demos. They were also the first "signs" committee, inventorying and evaluating signage accumulated over time. The next year, they helped Anne Beecher coordinate the Mini Quilt Auction, in addition to their duties with Demos and Signs, and Mary worked take down. 2008 was also when she began helping out at the judging table. In 2009, the duo agreed to chair the Mini Quilt Auction, and have become the longest-running mini-auction dynamic duo since the auction was inaugurated. As if Mary wasn't busy enough with that, she continued to co-chair Demos with Bonnie, help with the judging committee and quilt take down. She was recruited to chair the judging committee in 2010, with Marla Kelsey joining her as co-chair. For 2012, she continues to co-chair Judging/Awards and the Mini Auction in addition to volunteering as needed in other roles.

Mary helps with *Covers for Kids* in a unique way - by coordinating a sewing group at her church, Prince of Peace, who stitch the tops. In turn, she quilts the tops on her long-arm machine.

Martha Smith

Martha is a native of the Dallas area, growing up in Highland Park. She is an avid Texas Ranger's baseball fan and a Master Gardener. She volunteers at the Farmers Branch Historical Park working with children and giving tours. After retiring from Neiman-Marcus after a 24-year career, she now has her own jewelry business. Martha lives in Dallas with her husband Russell. Daughter Emily, a graduate of University of North Texas, also lives in the Dallas area.

Martha joined the guild in May 1986. She enjoys hand piecing and hand quilting. It was a proud moment when she won a 3rd place ribbon at Dallas Quilt Celebration for her *Family Tree Album Quilt*.

She is half of the team that took over the Guild library from Peggy Keirstead some years ago. With Marte Keller's assistance, they have worked hard to get the library up-to-date, culling out elderly/unpopular titles and adding fresh, enticing ones. They've also worked to make it easy for Guild members to locate the types of books they may be seeking, by adding simple signage to each cart that indicates what is available, be it applique, historical, etc. and is an avid student of quilt history.

Red Roses!

At the December meeting, President Judy Kriehn surprised four long-time Guild members/volunteers with the Red Rose Award. This award honors members who have received the Yellow Rose in recognition of their contributions at least five years prior to receiving the Red Rose, and have continued to be active, contributing Guild members.

Carol Dickschat was president when the award was initiated by the Board. She has served not only as Guild President, but as Show Chair, Ways and Means Vice President, Community Service Vice President and a chairman or member of a number of different committees. She's one of the people that we all depend on – not just as a volunteer, but as a “voice of reason”. She received the Yellow Rose award in 2000 and the Silver Thimble award in 2005.

Judy notes that **Shelly Guibert** was serving as Programs Vice President at the time that she began to regularly attend Guild meetings. As Guild President, she noted that Judy had indicated an interest in the Directory, and invited her to chair the committee. Since completing her presidency – way back in 1999, she has remained a regular Guild volunteer, sewing tops with Covers for Kids, serving in various capacities on the Show committee, ranging from a two-year stint as VP-Show (Show Chair), entries chairman, special exhibits chairman, guild store chairman, mini auction chairman, raffle quilt chairman, and in other roles as needed including directory chairman and newsletter editor. She received a Silver Thimble award in 1996, the Founder's Award in 2001, and the Yellow Rose award in 2004

Contrary to popular belief, **Rhonda Anderson** is NOT in charge of Community Service; she just coordinates a big chunk of it, and has been a fixture at the Community Service table for longer than many of us can remember. While she's never served as Guild President, she is OBVIOUSLY one of our most loyal volunteers, not only coordinating our Covers for Kids program for umpteen years, but she has chaired or been a member of more committees than we can count, including Raffle quilt, Nominations, and more. She received the Silver Thimble Award in 1998, a Yellow Rose award in 2000, and the Founder's Award in 2002.

Marie Zaczkowski began her volunteer activities as Guild Treasurer, a post she held for many years, until she was coaxed into running for Vice President – Finance, and subsequently Guild President. She is currently in year one of a two-year term (we hope) as Show Chairman. She has put in countless hours (and years) as Workshop coordinator, keeping a succession of VP-Programs & Workshops sane (including me!), she is a regular Covers for Kids volunteer, and is finishing out a stint as our representative to the Texas Association of Quilt Guilds. She received a Yellow Rose award in 2000, a Silver Thimble Award in 2001, and the Founder's Award in 2006.

Note from Newsletter

Editor: Items that are detailed elsewhere in the newsletter are shortened here in the interest of space.

President Judy Kriehn opened the meeting at 7:15 p.m., welcoming guests and new members. She announced that on November 7, 1979, the Quilt Guild of Dallas was founded, so its 33rd anniversary was being celebrated with refreshments and announcement of Red Rose, and Silver Thimble Awards for 2012.

She noted that Red Rose Award was created in 2004 by the Executive Board as a new means to honor volunteers. Recipients received a Yellow Rose Award at least five years prior to the presentation of the Red Rose Award, and continued to be an active, contributing member of our Guild.

Judy announced the following recipients of the Red Rose Award.
