The Quilters Guild of Dallas held their monthly general meeting on Thursday, December 1, 2005, at Congregation Shearith Israel. President, *Barbara Oliver Hartman*, brought the meeting to order at 7:15 p.m. *Barbara* welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Barbara extended a special welcome to our two new members and reminded them that the guild meetings move quickly, so please ask questions if any information seems confusing as "we tend to use our own jargon".

Beginning in January, 2006, the Executive Board Meeting location will change to the REI store in Dallas on the LBJ service road.

Barbara also introduced Marilou Wimmer as the new Chairman of Growth and Development. Marilou is a former President and was instrumental in setting up the guild's non-profit status, the Endowment Committee and the Plano and Allen guilds.

COMMITTEE ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mary Howard, Sunshine and Shadows, announced that Barbara Daniel's Mother passed away in October and to please remember Barbara in your prayers.

Shelly Goodwyn, Show Entries, playfully stated that there were only 5 slots left for the 2006 show entries. After many gasps, Shelly reminded everyone to get the quilts ready for entries.

Linda Bartley, Show Youth Project, asked that we get the word out to youth groups in our churches, schools and scouts about the project. She provided flyers to attendees.

Anne Beecher, January Retreat, stated that the room list will be provided to the hotel this week. The Saturday night theme will be Hawaiian and retreat tee shirts will be available for pick up at the January meeting.

Anne Colvin Mosher, Programs, announced that Hollis Chatelain will be the featured speaker at the January meeting. There will be 3 days of workshops. A 2 day workshop on painting with dye will be on January 5th and 6th at the Springfield Retreat Center in Richardson. On Saturday, January 7th, the workshop will focus on quilting as a design aspect and will be held at the Bank Building near Arapaho and North Central Expressway. 

QUILT CELEBRATION 2006

2005 Show Chair

Entries are due January 5th – don't mean to sound like anyone's mother, but time sure flies! I can't believe the deadline is here already. We are sticking to the limit of 400 entries overall, so get your entries into Shelly Goodwyn before the 5th. Full instructions, category details, and the entry form can be found in the pre-show brochure mailed with your November newsletter, or the same package can be downloaded from the Guild website at www.quiltersguildofdallas.org.

There will be multiple opportunities for signing up for your volunteer spots in the upcoming months – there will be sign up tables at the meetings leading up to the show, and you can choose your time slots and select the type of work you'd like to do. There are plenty of choices available, because this show is entirely volunteer-driven. If it is more convenient for you, you can also send a sign-up sheet to as indicated in the pre-show brochure, mentioned above, and you will be all set.

I want to highlight a few of the volunteer opportunities available to you at the show, in case you are new to the Guild or new to the show:

Staff Lounge: The Staff Lounge is where we 'feed and water' the volunteers and the vendors. This is a great place to get to know people. The Chairs of this area, Theresa Cernosek, Terry Reese, and Charmaine Harris have this running like a well-oiled machine; you help them put food out, greet people as they come in and tell them what's available, make sure everyone has enough to eat, assist with clean-up if needed. This is good work for all ages, skills and abilities.

Quilt Angels: These are our intrepid eyes and ears on the show floor. You help visitors enjoy the quilts by sharing how they are made; you help people remember to not touch the quilts; you might give directions. We need lots of quilt angels, because we use them throughout the show. This is a great way to take part in the show.

Vendor Booth Sitters: We try to assist vendors who need a break for something to eat or just for a quick rest by allowing them to take 20 minutes or so away from their booths. Vendor booth sitters take care of the booths while the vendors take their break – the vendors tell you exactly what they want you to do while you are there, so you don't need to be afraid about not knowing something. Frequently they just tell you to sit there and tell people they will be back in 15 minutes.

Set Up: Set Up volunteers hang the show on Wednesday. You get to see the quilts first! This set of

volunteers hangs the quilts on the rods according to the show layout, and then helps pin the signs on the quilts once the categories are hung. This is fun and we need a lot of volunteers, especially some who don't mind climbing ladders.

Take Down: Just the opposite of Set Up, Take Down volunteers tear the show down on Sunday night, starting right as the show closes. Again, we need lots of volunteers and lots of people who can climb ladders. This moves very fast – you carefully fold and pack the quilts into their pillowcases with their signs and ribbons, if present, then the quilts are returned to Entries for giving back to the owners there at the show or for shipment. If you have a quilt in the show that you need to retrieve Sunday evening, this is a great way to fill the time between the show closing at 5:00 and when your quilt is available, about 6:30.

l'Il highlight some additional volunteer opportunities next month. The wonderful volunteers at the sign-up table at the meeting can also answer any questions you have. I hope everyone has had some time during the holidays to get some quilting in – Happy New Year 2006 to everyone!

Quilt Appraisals for New or Old Quilts

Now is the time to schedule appraisals!

Gerald Roy and Lisa Erlandson are both certified appraisers who will be appraising quilts and garments at the show this year.

Having an appraisal for your quilt is important for insurance purposes. Shipping companies are selfinsured, which means that should your item be lost or damaged in transit, the shipper will very likely dispute the insurance value of the item without written proof. This also holds true even while items are in your possession, if your home should suffer a disaster and quilts are part of the loss.

Appraisals are \$40.00 each and are scheduled every one-half hour on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. You do not have to be present for the appraisal, but are welcome to attend. (An appraisal is not a critique of your work). Appraisals are for insurance purposes unless otherwise noted.

Fill out the appraisal form in your entry package and send it to me along with your check and a self-addressed stamped envelope. A confirmation letter will be sent.

Spotlight on the Piececorps Friendship Group

JANUARY PROGRAM

January 5, 2006

This month, we will host award-winning quilter **Hollis Chatelain.** She is best known for her whole-cloth quilts featuring paintings derived from her experiences living in west Africa for fourteen years. With a background in design and photography, Hollis began working with fiber in Africa. Her interest was sparked by the richness and beauty of African fabrics which are ever so integrated into the everyday life of Africans. Her distinctive use of colors and imagery, as well as her dye-painted scenes of multicultural life have brought her international recognition. Her quilt, "Precious Water," won the That Patchwork Place Best of Show award in the judged show at International Quilt Festival in 2004.

Her lecture for the Guild is entitled:

The Relationship Between Drawing and Quilting

In order for the audience to better understand how these concepts can help them, she will show slides of both traditional and contemporary quilts that illustrate a good use of line, negative spaces, light and shadow or perspective. These quilts were made by a wide variety of quilters from the USA and Europe.

In addition to her lecture, Guild members have the rare treat of THREE DAYS of workshops available.

Painting Images with Dyes

(two-day workshop on Thursday, January 5 and Friday, January 6)

This workshop is designed to teach you how to paint with Procion MX dyes on cotton. Learning to control the dyes will be emphasized. Among other things, we will cover blending, layering, special effects and painting without bleeding while using no resists. All of these techniques can be used to create images as complex as portraits or as simple as a line on a scarf. The two-day workshop will be held at the Springhill Retreat Center near Renner and Northstar in Richardson.

Quilt Line as the Third Design Aspect

(one day workshop on Saturday, January 7)

This is a "process" class (no sewing!) that will help you find new ideas for using your quilting to enhance the look of your quilt. Discussion will address going a step further than merely holding together the quilt sandwich with stitches. The primary objective is to use the quilting lines to create depth, texture, tension, or shadowing, which in turn will give an added dimension to the quilt. The lines used can be inspired by an endless variety of things such as nature, architecture or

technology. Even straight lines can become design elements. Students will bring 1-3 un-quilted tops each, and the class will have an interactive lecture/discussion about the possibilities for enhancing the best features in the quilt top design and diminishing the parts liked the least.

This workshop will be held at the community room at the bank building near Arapaho and N. Central. The class is filling FAST, so don't delay.

This month, we welcome back Guild member **Dr. Dana Lacy Chapman**, now a resident of Golden, Colorado. Her lecture will be "**Designs on My Wall**."

Her Friday workshop is entitled "**Photos as a Design Beginning**." If you've ever been curious about printing designs on fabric to use in your quilts, this will show you more than the average "photo framed with sashing" design.

Dana's Saturday workshop is entitled "*Threads*, *Needles, and Results in Free-Motion Quilting*."
